## Letter From Father César



Dear Parish Family,

This weekend we celebrate "Gaudete". We hear today's Mass begins with the opening antiphon, "Gaudete in Domino semper" ("Rejoice in the Lord always"). We light the rose candle of the Advent wreath, and the priest may wear rose vestments to express our communal joy in the coming of

Jesus, as our Savior. The theme of the third Sunday of Advent is rejoicing in hope.

Advent is a time for joy, not only because we are anticipating the anniversary of the birth of Jesus, but also because God is already in our midst. Christian joy does not come from the absence of sorrow, pain or trouble, but from an awareness of the presence of Christ within our souls.

On this weekend's first reading, the prophet Zephaniah says, "Shout for joy, O Zion! Sing joyfully, O Israel." Zephaniah made this prophetic proclamation at the height of the Jewish exile when things appeared hopeless and unbearable. The instruction is repeated in the response to the Psalm, "Sing and shout for joy for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel."

St. Paul echoes the same message of joy in the second reading, taken from his letter to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again, rejoice... The Lord is in your midst... Fear not... be not discouraged... The Lord is near. Have no anxiety at all..." Paul was imprisoned when he made this appeal for rejoicing.

In the gospel today, John the Baptist explains the secret of Christian joy as wholehearted commitment to God's way by doing His will. A sad Christian is a contradiction in terms. According to the Baptizer, happiness comes from doing our duties faithfully, doing good to others and sharing our blessings with others. John's call to repentance is a call to joy and restoration. *Repentance* means a change in the purpose and direction of our lives. Filled with joyful expectation that the Messiah was near, the people asked John, "*What should we do?*" He told them to act with justice, charity and honesty, letting their lives reflect their transformation. For us, that transformation occurs when Christ enters our lives, and it is to be reflected in our living in the ways John suggested.

"Don't you give out warnings?" A state trooper Once he stopped a woman for going 15 miles an hour over the speed limit. After he handed her a ticket, she asked him, "Don't you give out warnings?" "Yes, ma'am," he replied. "They're all up and down the road. They say, 'Speed Limit 55." People have a tendency to disregard the warning signs, don't they? Sometimes with dire consequences. Today's gospel presents John the Baptist warning the Jewish People of the need of repentance and conversion with prophetic courage.

We pray this weekend we see the signs/warnings about lives. May we rejoice in the blessings we have received from the Lord, and may we make the proper changes were needed to live in wholeness of life as God intends from us.

## **Gospel Reflection**

The 3rd Sunday of Advent, also known as Gaudete Sunday, invites us to rejoice and find hope in the coming of our Lord. The readings from Zephaniah, Philippians, and Luke encourage us to celebrate God's presence, find peace in His love, and prepare our hearts for Jesus. We are reminded of the joy and anticipation that this special time of Advent brings. Returning to Joy and Hope

#### **Rejoicing in God's Presence**

The first reading is from Zephaniah. It speaks of joy and celebration because God is with His people. Zephaniah tells us to shout for joy and be glad because the Lord has removed the judgment against us. He is in our midst, and we have no reason to fear. This reading reminds us of the theme of joyful anticipation. We are called to be happy and hopeful because God is near. When we feel anxious or worried, we can find comfort in knowing that God is with us. He loves us and will take care of us.

God's presence brings peace and safety. Zephaniah describes a world where God protects and saves His people. This is a powerful image of God's love and care. We are encouraged to trust in God and believe that He will keep us safe. On the 3rd Sunday of Advent Year C, we focus on rejoicing and being glad. Zephaniah's words remind us to celebrate because God is with us. As we prepare for Christmas, let's remember to find joy in God's presence and share that joy with others.

#### Finding Joy and Peace in God

The second reading is from Philippians. St. Paul tells us to always rejoice in the Lord and not to worry about anything. He encourages us to pray and give thanks to God, and then we will experience God's peace. This reading emphasizes the theme of joyful anticipation. St. Paul reminds us that joy comes from knowing God is near. When we focus on God and His love for us, we can find happiness even in difficult times.

St. Paul also talks about the peace of God. This peace is not like the peace the world gives. It is a deep sense of calm and trust that God is taking care of us. When we feel anxious or worried, we can turn to God in prayer and experience His peace. On the 3rd Sunday of Advent, we are invited to rejoice and be at peace. St. Paul's words remind us to focus on God and His blessings. As we prepare for Christmas, let's remember to find joy and peace in our relationship with God and share that joy with others.

#### **Embracing the Change Jesus Brings**

The Gospel shows how Jesus brings change. John the Baptist speaks of Jesus, who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire. He describes Jesus holding a winnowing fan to clear the threshing floor, separating the wheat from the chaff. This shows that Jesus will bring a new way of living, one that challenges the old ways. Some of us feel comfortable with the way things are. Life is good, and we do not want it to change. We feel secure and happy. Others among us welcome change because we live in difficult situations. We hope for a better life and trust that change will bring it. Some of us are in between, wanting change but also fearing the loss of what we have.

We often hold tightly to our possessions and positions, wanting to secure our future. But God's vision is bigger. He dreams of a world where everyone has what they need. This is a good time to reflect on our lives. Are we helping to build a world where everyone is cared for? Or are we part of systems that keep people down?

The 3rd Sunday of Advent invites us to welcome the change Jesus brings. It encourages us to look beyond our comfort and seek God's bigger plan. By doing this, we prepare our hearts for Jesus' coming and help create a more just and loving world.

Let us carry the themes of joy, peace, and preparation in our hearts. Let us rejoice in God's presence, find comfort in His peace, and actively prepare for Jesus' coming.

May we be inspired to live out our faith with renewed hope and love during this Advent season.

### <u>Advent Prayer</u>

Lord, fill our hearts with joy and peace as we prepare for Jesus' coming. Help us to rejoice in Your presence and trust in Your care. Guide us to share Your love with others. Amen.

#### **Reflection Questions**

- What changes can I make to better align my life with God's vision?
  - How does knowing God is with me help me face challenges?
- What actions can I take to build a more just and loving community?
- How can I help others find joy and peace during this Advent season?

## FAMILY CONNECTION

The theme of the season of Advent is sometimes described as a period of waiting for the birth of Jesus. However, today's Gospel reading suggests something different. John the Baptist did not tell the crowds to wait for the Messiah. He told them to prepare for the Messiah through acts of repentance. If Advent is a time of waiting, it is not the sitting in the doctor's office kind of waiting. It is a busy time of preparation, more like the waiting we might do when preparing for dinner guests. Our challenge is to not make this season a frenzied time, but rather a time of joyful anticipation and making ready for God who comes to dwell among us and changes our lives with the gift of salvation.

As you gather as a family, talk about the preparations your family is making during the season of Advent. Reflect together on these activities, not only on what you are doing but why you are choosing to do these things. Read together today's Gospel, Luke 3:10-18. Consider how Advent is a time for making ourselves ready to receive Jesus in our lives. Could your family make some changes in your Advent activities so that each person is well prepared to celebrate the gift of salvation at Christmas? Conclude in prayer together that your family will be able to live the spirit of Advent. Sing together an Advent song, such as "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" or pray together today's second reading, Philippians 4:4-7, as you light the third candle on your Advent wreath.


