### Letter From Father César



Dear Parish Family,

We are approaching the end of our preparation time for the celebration of Our Lord's Nativity. Our Advent Season has been a great time of grace. I hope that the different liturgies, the advent booklet and Penance Services have been for you a great opportunity to "prepare the way to the Lord."

Starting on the 16th we have been holding "Las Posadas": Las Posadas is a nine-day prayer service with a festival that commemorates Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem to give birth to

Jesus. The word "posadas" is Spanish for "lodgings" or "accommodations". They are celebrated between December 16 and December 24 in Latin America, El Salvador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, and by Latin Americans in the United States. Thank you to all the groups that hosted one of the posadas this year.

For some time now we might have been listening to Christmas music. Perhaps there are a million things on our minds now: gifts to wrap, dinner to prepare, cards to write, shopping hangover, etc. Let us place all those million worries aside and keep still and come to the silence of The Night that is approaching this week. Let us listen carefully to a different kind of sound, the sound of our longing. To help us listen, you can perhaps clasp your hands (*close your eyes if that helps*) and ponder what we have been wanting all along, what our hearts have been truly longing for all these years. What do we truly wish for every Christmas? If Heaven were to ask us tonight what our lifelong wishes are, what would these be? Whisper a prayer to the Child, tell him what we most desire today. What is your lifelong wish?

Perhaps on Christmas Night our only lifelong wish is to love and be loved. If heaven could grant our wish, perhaps we only ask to be more patient, more kind, more grateful. Perhaps this Christmas we long to begin forgiving or to be forgiven. Perhaps we yearn to be less distant, more loving with those who are near to us. Perhaps our only want is for our children to remember us, to visit us. To be close, to be family again. Perhaps as the song goes, we only want her or him, our beloved, to be home for Christmas. Perhaps we are yearning to have the strength to let go, to be faithful, to be free. Maybe today, we only want to understand the one who has hurt us. Perhaps our heart's desire is to be less jealous or envious or anxious. If only perhaps we could be less afraid or insecure, if only we could find rest for our weary lives.

Perhaps we have been wanting to say the words "I love you" but we cannot and can only mean the love indirectly. Today perhaps we only want to trust that God is still kind, and that life is still good. Perhaps we wish for once we could refrain from the words and silences that so readily tear our lives apart. Perhaps our only longing now is to be able to pick up the broken pieces of our life and go on believing that even shards and splinters are never wasted. Perhaps we only want to be quiet and alone, to allow time to heal our heart. Perhaps today our only wish is to not be alone, to have a friend, to be a friend, or for love to never end...

Christmas longing is something that we allow to grow on us. Only after many Christmases do we discover that the longing just as much abides in God as it does in us. It is not only we who long for the wholeness of Paradise again.

The Child that sleeps in a manger is no genie in a bottle, no baby Santa with a sack full of gifts, no Aladdin living in some magical lamp; the Child of Mary is neither falling star to wish upon nor fairy godmother to our Cinderella dreams. If we were to cradle this Child in our arms or sit him on our lap, and if we were to let his little hands clasp and curl around our little pinky finger, we would soon realize that this Child also needs what we need; that this Child will never be the same without our love; this Child longs for what we long for, desires our very desires; this Child dreams what we dream of.

If this Christmas the Child Jesus should wake us from our sleep, cradle him in your arms and whisper tender little things to soothe his need and longing. Hush him back to sleep in the manger of your heart. Whisper to him how real our longing is to love and be loved. Tell him how afraid we are to be alone. Then whisper to him that we love him despite all the fallen pieces, despite all that has happened to your life. Whisper to him how much we long to love him and there be consoled to find in the very longing itself the nearness of all that we desire. Who we have been longing for all our lives is this Child whose little hands reflexively clasp and curl around our finger, this Child who longs for whatever much love is still left in our lives. Our lifelong wish sleeps right here in the manger of our heart.

## Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb

Luke 1:42

#### SCRIPTURE READINGS:

#### **Gospel Reflection**

The 4th Sunday of Advent brings us closer to the birth of Jesus and invites us to reflect on important themes. Through the readings from Micah, Hebrews, and Luke, we learn about God's promise, the importance of humble beginnings, obedience to God's will, and recognizing Jesus in our lives. Reflecting on these readings helps prepare our hearts for the joy of Christmas

#### **God's Promise in Humble Beginnings**

The 4th Sunday of Advent Year C brings us the first reading from Micah, which speaks of a ruler coming from Bethlehem. This small town does not seem important, yet it is chosen by God. This teaches us that God often works through humble beginnings. Bethlehem is not a grand city, but it becomes the birthplace of Jesus. This shows that greatness can come from small and simple places. We are reminded that God values humility and often chooses what the world might overlook. God's promise to send a ruler from Bethlehem shows His faithfulness. He keeps His promises, no matter how small the beginnings. We can trust that God has a plan for each of us, even if it starts in humble places. This Sunday encourages us to see the potential in our own humble beginnings. We should not be discouraged by small starts but trust that God can do great things through them. By embracing humility and trusting in God's promises, we prepare our hearts for the coming of Jesus.

#### Obedience to God's Will

The second reading for the 4th Sunday of Advent highlights Jesus' obedience to God's will. In Hebrews, Jesus declares that He came to do what God wanted, not what He wanted. This teaches us the importance of putting God's will above our own desires. Jesus offers Himself as a sacrifice, showing the ultimate act of obedience. This is not just a one-time event but a lifelong commitment to following God's plan. We are called to follow Jesus' example by seeking and doing God's will in our lives.

Obeying God can be challenging, especially when it goes against our own plans. However, the 4th Sunday of Advent Year C reminds us that true fulfillment comes from aligning our lives with God's purposes. This obedience leads to a deeper relationship with God and a more meaningful life. Reflecting on Jesus' obedience encourages us to examine our own lives. Are we willing to sacrifice our desires to follow God's will? The 4th Sunday of Advent calls us to commit to this path, preparing our hearts for the coming of Jesus through our acts of obedience and faith.

#### **Recognizing Jesus in Our Lives**

The 4th Sunday of Advent reminds us to be always looking for signs of God's presence in our lives. The Visitation, where Mary visits Elizabeth, is full of joy. Elizabeth recognizes Jesus when her baby, John, leaps in her womb. This moment shows us the importance of being open to God's presence in everyday moments. Elizabeth could have dismissed her baby's movement as just another kick. Instead, she saw it as a sign of something bigger. She recognized it as a moment of grace and the closeness of redemption. This teaches us to see God's hand in small, everyday events.

Jesus came to us as a baby in Bethlehem, but He also comes to us in our daily lives. If we only see Him in the nativity scene, we miss many moments of grace. We need to be ready to encounter Him in our interactions with each other. Through prayer and the sacraments, we prepare ourselves to recognize and welcome Jesus every day.

The 4th Sunday of Advent Year C encourages us to be watchful and open to God's presence. Like Elizabeth, we should be aware of the signs of grace around us. By doing so, we prepare our hearts for Jesus and experience the joy of His coming, not just at Christmas but every day.

## **Advent Prayer**

Lord, help us to see Your presence in our daily lives. Guide us to be humble and obedient to Your will. May we recognize and welcome Jesus in every moment. Amen.

## **Reflection Questions**

- What can you learn from Jesus' humble beginnings in Bethlehem?
  How can you practice humility in your own life?
  - What are some small signs of grace you might have overlooked?
    - How can you prepare your heart to encounter Jesus daily?

#### **FAMILY CONNECTION**

In the encounter between Mary and Elizabeth described in today's Gospel, we learn that other people can help us recognize God's presence and action in our lives. Mary traveled to see Elizabeth because Elizabeth's pregnancy was a sign that everything the angel told Mary would truly happen. Elizabeth recognized Mary as the mother of her Lord because her unborn child, John the Baptist, leapt at the sound of Mary's greeting. Elizabeth and Mary rejoiced together at the wonderful things God was doing in their lives. We too are blessed when we have people who help us recognize God's action in our lives. We pray that our family can be this for one another. As you gather as a family, work together on a word

search or hidden-picture puzzle. Help one another until everyone has found each of the words or pictures in the puzzle. Talk about this experience, noticing how some people found words or pictures more easily than others and how easy it was to see the word or picture once someone else pointed it out. Observe that sometimes we need the help of others to recognize God's presence and action in our lives. Read together today's Gospel, Luke 1:39-45. Ask: What did Elizabeth recognize about Mary? (that she was to be the mother of Jesus, the Lord) How did Elizabeth know this? (Her baby, John the Baptist, leapt with joy at Mary's greeting) Pray together that as we share our faith together as a family, we may help one another recognize God's presence and action in our lives. Pray together the Hail Marv.




