



Letter From Father César



Dear Parish Family

Two weeks from Wednesday we will begin Lent – with Ash Wednesday we will start our annual 40-day Lenten Retreat. Would it be too soon to start thinking about and preparing for Lent? Lent will require from us to focus, if it is to affect each one of us, if it is to bring us

closer to Christ. Then we would need to focus.

Perhaps we need to start making some preparations now, perhaps we have let too many Lents go by, without a focus. Too often we stumble into Lent only to realize that we have given no thought to how we might make Lent more meaningful, more affective *and* effective. We have two weeks to focus on a purpose, so that when Easter comes, we might realize a change in our lives; a deeper relationship with our God.

Our Gospel today provides a hint to help us find our focus this coming Lent. Hearing the Beatitudes we might think about what a specific group "will" receive in the future.

But in the Gospel of Luke the first Beatitude is about what the poor "already have":

"Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God IS yours" The poor have already received the kingdom of God. They have it now. It is not something they will get later. The world is not a great place for the poor, and the gospel of Luke truly means the economically poor, not the "poor in spirit" like the gospel of Matthew, says.

If the world is not so easy on the poor, how do they already have it? It doesn't look like they have a Kingdom. Luke's gospel is not talking about a place nor is he speaking about the poor having all their needs met; he is teaching us about a way of living. At the end he speaks of a culture.

With Jesus' teaching there is a new "culture of God" rising in the world, a culture that stands opposed to the culture of the society in which the disciples were living, in which we live. The gospel of Matthew speaks of a transcendent world and how we should live for that world to come. Luke's gospel on the contrary is teaching us how to live "in" the world as it is right now. We are to live in the world by helping build the new culture/the kingdom of God.

Speaking only to the disciples, the Gospel of Luke is speaking to Christians back then and to all of us today. His community of Christians had a lot of rich people. They were well fed. For the most part they did not worry about where they would lay their head at night or about their next meal. For the disciples, being "rich" was viewed as being an outward sign that a person was blessed or favored by God. Being poor was a sign of being outside of God's family.

In the Gospel of Luke, Christ reverses this notion. It is the poor who have the Kingdom, and they have it now. The rich, these disciples — all of us — may not have it at all now or in the future, if we don't live within God's culture.

How is God's culture different than our culture; In our culture, the poor serve the rich, or more commonly said those who don't have work for those who do. In God's culture, in God's kingdom, the rich work for the poor. To be rich, is to be blessed, but it is to be blessed for a purpose, for a vocation. To be rich, is to be put into a position by God to help and to serve the poor. In God's culture He uses the phrase, "well done good and faithful servant." when we have done what we were supposed to do with the most insignificant of our brothers and sisters. Our reward is not worldly recognition; it is knowing that we have pleased God.

This coming Lent, our focus can be; How do I become part of the culture of God? How do I promote God's culture wherever I go? How do I become a good and faithful servant?

Reflection

The readings for the 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C focus on themes of trust, resurrection, and true happiness. Jeremiah, Paul, and Jesus each offer insights into how we should live our lives in faith. These reflections explore what it means to trust in God, the hope found in Jesus' resurrection, and the blessings and woes of our earthly lives.

Trusting in God's Strength

Jeremiah, in the reading, warns us against trusting in human strength. He compares those who trust in humans to a shrub in the desert, dry and struggling to survive. This shows that relying on ourselves or others can leave us feeling empty and lost. Instead, Jeremiah calls us to trust in God. Those who trust in God are like a tree planted by water, always green and fruitful. This image helps us understand that God's support brings life and strength.

Trusting in God means turning to Him in all situations. It means praying and seeking His guidance. The 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C reminds us that true happiness comes from relying on God, not on our own abilities.

Hope in the Resurrection

In 1 Corinthians, Paul talks about the resurrection of Jesus. He explains that our faith is built on the truth that Jesus rose from the dead. Without the resurrection, our faith is useless, and we have no hope. Paul's message shows us that the resurrection is central to our faith. It gives us hope for eternal life with Jesus. This hope helps us face difficulties and challenges with confidence. Believing in the resurrection means trusting that Jesus conquered death. It means having faith that we too will have eternal life. The 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C teaches us to hold on to this hope and live with joy, knowing that Jesus is alive.

Blessings and Woes

The readings talk about blessings and woes. Jeremiah speaks about blessings for those who trust in God and curses for those who trust in humans. These verses remind us to seek blessings through faith in God. Jesus, in the Gospel, talks about the blessings of the poor and hungry. He contrasts their future joy with the sorrow of the rich and satisfied. Jesus warns those who are comfortable now that their happiness is temporary.

This message teaches us to look for true happiness in God. It reminds us that worldly comforts are not lasting. The 6th Sunday encourages us to trust in God and seek His blessings, knowing that He cares for those in need.

The 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C reminds us to trust in God's strength, hold on to the hope of the resurrection, and seek true happiness in Him. These reflections encourage us to deepen our faith and rely on God's guidance in all aspects of our lives. Let us open our hearts to these messages and live with faith and hope.

Prayer

Lord, help us to trust in You and not in ourselves. Strengthen our faith in the resurrection and guide us to seek true happiness in Your blessings. Amen.

Reflection Questions

- ♦ What does it mean to trust in God's strength in your daily life?
- ♦ How can you rely less on human strength and more on God?

♦ Why is the resurrection of Jesus central to your faith?

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FAMILY CONNECTION

Today's Gospel offers a contrast to many of the messages we hear in our society today. If we were to accept uncritically the "get ahead" messages of our culture, we would think that happiness means having money, being successful, and having many possessions. In this way, we are not unlike the people who heard Jesus teach on the day that he taught the Beatitudes. They too associated happiness with possessions and success. The report of the Beatitudes in Luke's Gospel, however, takes things one step further. Not only will we not find happiness through the "get ahead" messages of the world, but relying upon these messages will cause us harm. The warnings spoken are particularly challenging because they suggest that our way of life must change if we are to gain the lasting happiness of eternal life.

Talk together as a family about what society tells us makes a person successful. Make a list of the traits that you associate with a successful person. Then read together today's Gospel, Luke 6:17,20–26. Reflect on Jesus' description of blessedness in the Kingdom of God. Then consider the warnings. Why are these surprising and challenging? What, then, is the measure of success in the Kingdom of God? Together write prayers of petition based on your discussion. Pray these prayers together, asking God to help your family seek the blessings of the Kingdom of God.
